Trustees' Annual Report

Public Private Benefit

The objectives of the Group are as a unit of the Scout Association. The aim of the Scout Association is to promote the development of young people in achieving their full physical, intellectual, social and spiritual potentials, as individuals, as responsible citizens and as members of their local, national and international communities. The method of achieving the aim of the Association is by providing an enjoyable and attractive scheme of progressive training, based on the Scout Promise and Laws and guided by adult leadership.

Subscriptions are charged for membership to cover immediate running costs of the Group and these do not unduly restrict membership. The Group follows the principle that no one should be excluded because of their inability to pay membership subscriptions.

Two key principles demonstrate that Scouting's aims are for the public benefit are that through the Scout method young people develop towards their full potential and that there is a clear link between the benefits for young people and the purpose of Scouting. The safety of young people is taken very seriously and the benefits Scouting activities provide far outweigh the risks. Any private benefits from Scouting are incidental, other than to those as a beneficiary.

Chairman's Report – 2016/7

The year ending April 2017 saw some significant changes in leadership. However, a strong Scouting programme continued to be delivered and the Group remains in good overall health.

In December 2016, following a search activity, David Shickle was appointed to the role of Group Scout Leader, replacing Neil Dallen who had been in post for 26 years. Neil left the Group with a strong legacy and we thank him for his many years of passionate service to the Group. At the same time, Jonathan Dart stood down as Chairman, and I was invited by David to replace him. Again, our thanks go to Jonathan for his work for the Group over the years.

The individual sections have continued their rich offering of activities, badges and camps. The annual Water Weekend is a highlight of the calendar and enjoyed by all. Throughout the year other camps have been enjoyed by the different sections.

It was a quiet year on the international front, but at home the events and activities for the year continued. We participate in a full range of competitions and challenges and feature highly in the results. This includes District bowling, cross country and football tournaments, and the Challenge Hike that was won by two Explorers. Our shooting club attended the National Championships and was successful in winning 13 medals across 7 disciplines.

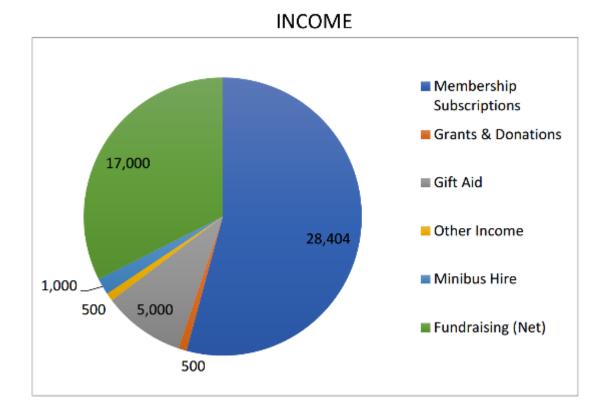

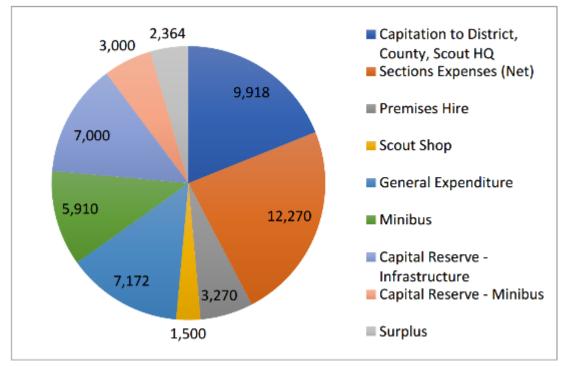
Our Year in Numbers

Independent Examiner's Report to the Trustees

I report on the accounts of the Group for the year ended 31 March 2017, which are set out on pages 8 to 12.

Respective responsibilities of trustees and examiner

The Group's trustees are responsible for the preparation of the accounts. They consider that an audit is not required for this year (under section 43(2) of the Charities Act 1993, and that an independent examination is required.

It is my responsibility to:

- Examine the accounts (under section 43 (3)(a) of the 1993 act;
- To follow the procedures laid down in the general directions given by the Charity Commissioners under section 43 (7)(b) of the 1993 act; and
- To state whether particular matters have come to my attention.

Basis of independent examiner's report

My examination was carried out in accordance with the General Directions given by the Charity Commissioners. An examination includes a review of the accounting records kept by the Group and a comparison of the accounts presented with those records. It also included consideration of any unusual items or disclosures in the accounts, and seeking explanations from you as trustees concerning such matters. The procedures undertaken do not provide all the evidence that would be required in an audit , and consequently I do not express an audit opinion on the view given in the accounts.

Major Activities and Achievements in the year

The annual review presented to all parents and interested parties prior to the AGM highlights the activities and achievements during the year. This is a comprehensive document that details numbers of young people in each section, a report from each section, abbreviated accounts and a review of the year.

At the end of the year the income reserves amounted to £500,431 (2016: £468,250). The Group's policy on reserves is to hold an amount that will enable it to replace the motor vehicles. The New HQ has now been recorded as an asset within the accounts and will be depreciated over the length of the 'license to occupy' i.e. 25 years.

The trustees have identified the major risks to which they believe the Group is exposed. They have reviewed these and established systems to mitigate them.

The objectives of the Group are to promote the development of young people in achieving their full physical, intellectual, social and spiritual potentials, as individuals, as responsible citizens and as members of their local, national and international communities.

The Group is a trust established under its rules, which are common to all Groups.

Trustees are appointed in accordance with the Policy, Organisation and Rules of the Scout Association. They are well acquainted over a number of years in local scouting.

The accounts have been drawn up on the Receipts and Payments basis, which is consistent with the previous year.

Explorer Leader's Report

The year is the first full year we have operated as one Explorer section, a change initiated due to both falling Explorer numbers and the loss of members of the leadership team. Having started the year with around 30 members we dropped to around 20 by Christmas, but since then we have had a large number of Scouts come up and we currently stand at 41 (with an expected membership of 50 by September). So we are at another 'bulge' and this brings both advantages and disadvantages. Large numbers generally bring more camaraderie, can cater for different interests and generate numbers for camps and competitions, but causes complications in premises, transport and splitting the group for activities.

The average age of the unit has probably dropped by a year, which again can bring challenges. We reintroduced the concept of an Explorers exec where the programme and some of the admin tasks are done by the young people, assisted by the leaders rather than the other way around. It is fair to say that this idea has suffered a bit as we lost the older ones but we intend to rebuild it with the new crop. I would like to say a special thank you to Jay who has been very loyal and worked hard to inspire and coordinate the other members.

The current leadership team of myself, Phili, Rich and Previn works well together and I would like to thank them for all their hard work. Kelly, having been let out of the Orang-utan sanctuary, now also supports us. We have also started a parents rota so we can rope in additional support when needed. We are however at the maximum numbers we can manage and could do we some additional permanent leaders.

James Burton and Harry Smith won the Explorer challenge hike this year and the Explorers have participated in a number of camps, notably Spring Bank, Water Weekend at Thames Young Mariners and Easter Ex in the Brecon Beacons where 20 of us had a great weekend. Easter Ex is a tough weekend physically but good fun and we always stay in a bunkhouse with decent facilities so we can warm up, dry out and relax when the walking is done. Thanks to Paul Carpenter and Jo Chartres, Jill Evans and Pete Browning who help us out on the various camps. Around 10 Explorers assist with other sections, generally as part of their DofE, and a number of our group are off to Sweden later in the year.

We have a varied programme ranging through Town Trails, Wide Games, Gaffer Tape Challenge, Debates, Ice Skating, Lego making, First Aid, Archery, Escape Night, Incident Hikes, Sailing, Cooking etc etc and try to balance activities from the traditional Scout programme with more general activities, but all have elements of fun and learning. Part of our Citizenship programme has included an 'adopted charity for the year' and this year we have chosen Wateraid. A lady from the charity came to talk to us about its work and we hope to raise some money through a sponsored bath push and a quiz night. Last year we raised £1500 for the Meningitis Research Foundation.

Its been a year of growth and challenges but overall a lot of fun has been had and we hope we have played a role in developing the young people into useful and productive citizens.

Shooting Club Report



The year ending March 2017 was the most successful one yet in terms of both individual and club successes.

Club membership went through its usual cycle of mid-year drop-off and subsequent pick-up to close at 31. This is at the top end of our limit – less than 20 does not work from a financial perspective while much more than 30 introduces safety issues. Of the 31 members, 21 members are from 7th Epsom with 10 coming from groups (1st Ashtead, 8th/14th Air Cadets, 1st Tattenhams and 7th Epsom Guides).

We entered the National Championships as usual in October and had our most successful year, returning with 13 medals across 7 disciplines. The full list of winners is on the Results page of our website (www.7essc.com) but aside from those we had another 9 top ten finishes – indeed in the 25yd Small-bore class we had 4 of the top 6 places. The difficulty in securing a medal should not be underestimated – in most disciplines there are several hundred competitors. Away from the ranges, the weather was kind (mostly) and the camping was excellent.

Also in October, British Shooting arranges a National Schools Pistol competition each year. Usually about 20 schools enter, with all of them being well-funded public schools including Millfield, Winchester and Sherbourne. This year Glyn School entered a team in the Senior category. The competition has two qualifying rounds; one each for the North and South of England with the top 3 schools going through to the finals. Additionally, there was an individual competition with the top 8 individual scores also qualifying for an individual final. The Glyn team of 3 was made up of 3 members of our club; Kieran Gall, James Miller and Emma O'Neill. In the qualifying rounds Glyn came 2nd and both James and Emma qualified for the individual finals. The finals were held in Cardiff in January, and I'm delighted to report that Glyn won the team competition (by quite a margin) and James won the individual competition.

Surrey Scouts organised an inaugural "Air Rifle Challenge" in November for Scouts only (no explorers). Entrants had to shoot a number of cards which were then checked and submitted to the organisers. The best 20 from across the county were then invited to a Grand Finals at Bisley. We had 6 scouts enter the competition, of

whom 5 made it through to the Finals, and after some excellent shooting it was won by one of our members, James Goldsmith.

British Shooting have introduced a new "Target Sprint" event which will be featuring in future Olympic Games. They held a range of qualifying events through late 2016 in which a number of our members participated. Both Kieran and Josh Gall made it through to the final sessions, with Kieran being selected for the Team GB squad (squad size is just 8). In March of this year, Kieran represented Great Britain at the inaugural World Championships in Germany and finished a superb 8th in the U21 category (Kieran is 17). His extraordinary time of 5mins and 12secs shaved 33secs off his previous best and he is now the Official British Record Holder.

Separately, James Miller shoots pistol for England and represented them at the major pistol competition, Intershoot in Holland. Over 3 days he scored 3 new personal bests and made all three finals – the only England shooter to do so. In the Mens U21 Grand Finals he came 5th having shot with the world's best 19 and 20-year olds (James is 16). This performance and his excellent scores means he is officially ranked and recognised as the No.1 U21 pistol shooter in England.

Aside from these key events and successes, the club continues to provide opportunities for other group activities. We provided shooting for scouts and explorers from 3rd Epsom and 1st Ashtead in 2016, and for 7th Epsom Guides earlier in 2017. We also ran a number of sessions for 7th Epsom cubs and we provided shooting as an option for the "Summer choices" Friday meetings.
