Beavers and Cubs Race around the World

Our Chief Scout, Bear Grylls, explains why we were racing to save over 500 Scout Groups hit hardest by the COVID-19 crisis. "Even before the pandemic struck, many of our Scout groups were struggling. They're struggling to pay their bills, buy basic equipment and attract enough volunteers. Over 500 groups, often in our most deprived areas, are now on the brink. If they close their doors, then a generation could miss out. They'd miss out on the friendship, the skills and the opportunities we offer. We can't let that happen. That's why I'm calling on each and every one of you to get involved." This led to the Race Around The World Scouting challenge to help fundraise. Together the UK Scout Association virtually travelled 150,000 miles around the world, raising over £350,000 through sponsorship and direct donations. The money raised across the whole Scout Association was matched by a generous donor taking the total to a grand sum of £650,000 towards the challenge to raise money for Scout Groups hit hardest by COVID-19.

Well the 7th Epsom Beavers and Cubs did not disappoint. We signed up straight away and did physical activities involving distance such as plane flying, but also learning about other countries and so completing the International badge.

Between them, the Beavers and Cubs played Captain's coming in French, iced biscuits with different flags and learnt about which countries have scouting and what they are called. They looked at different uniforms and compared the similarities and differences. They noted each one had the membership badge there! We moved to America and learnt about Thanksgiving, completed a Thanksgiving tree and made paper turkeys.

The fantastic fact was that through parental support we raised a staggering £600, to keep scouting continuing. A massive thank you to all who donated. I'll let the photos show the story.

Madagascar 2020 project update

Thanks to all the generous donations and hard work by the team fundraising for Madagascar we have started to see some feedback from the projects we have supported.

The girl's refuge, AAF, has started to build some inside toilets and bathrooms for the girls (they have none so far) and complete some work on a dining room. Hanta who runs the refuge sends regular photos of the work as it progresses.

The national scout centre, Tranom-Bitsika, has also started to build the toilet block we are financing. This will allow the building to be used by visiting scout groups and provide opportunities to generate income for the Malagasy TILY scout organisation. They are also installing windows and doors in the same building which is being financed by another UK scout group. We also receive regular photos and updates of the work as it progresses.
