Section Parent Representatives

We are seeking to get a Parent Representative in place for each of the sections in the 7th Epsom Group. The role is not onerous but does require some commitment & allows the Representatives to engage with the leaders and have their say on how the Sections and Group should be run. We already have representatives in place for several Sections, but have vacancies for Windfall Beavers, Apache and Cherokee Cubs, and Explorers, so please get in touch with your Section Leader if you would like to learn more about the role and how to get involved.

Transport Manager

The opportunities that we offer young people are only possible due to the effort, time and enthusiasm put in by a relatively small number of volunteers. This is an excellent opportunity for someone new to contribute and support the group who might feel that helping with the normal scouting activities isn't for them. Running our minibus is critical to the Scouting activities that the Group is able to provide. Due to relocation of the current role holder in 2020, we are now seeking a new role share for our Transport Manager, an activity which will take at most an hour or two each week. On behalf of the 7th Epsom (Methodist) Scout Exec, the Transport Manager manages and is responsible for the operation of the group's minibus and two trailers.

The role includes coordinating:

- Booking Management all year, but minimal effort
- Licensing and insurance a few interventions each year
- Managing Driver Assurance and Training as needed, but very infrequent
- Maintenance booking annual MoT and servicing together with any remedial maintenance required through the year

A full role specification is available on request, and if we get two volunteers, one can handle the first three items with all activities associated with maintenance handled by the other.


SCOUTS




EXPLORERS




Pumpkin Night ended the half term and everyone's creativity was in evidence! The
