Group Polo Shirts & Hoodies

I am pleased to announce that we are introducing Group polo shirts and hoodies to complement our existing uniform. The garments will be for all young people, leaders, supporters, parents and carers. Infact, they are for anyone who would like them.

Both items will be premium cotton 'Fruit of the Loom' garments and will have the scout logo and group name embroidered on the front. On the reverse there is a large, printed scout logo and group name as shown in the pictures below. It is intended that the polo shirts and hoodies can be worn on Group activities, where uniform is not necessary, but where it would be good to have a Group identity, such as fundraising activities, camps and day trips.

The cost for all section members (beavers to explorers) for the polo shirts is ± 12.50 and the hoodies are ± 15.00 . Due to VAT the cost for adults is ± 17.50 for polo shirts and ± 22 for hoodies.
