Help Needed—Transport Manager

The opportunities that we offer young people are only possible due to the effort, time and enthusiasm put in by a relatively small number of volunteers. This is an excellent opportunity for someone new to contribute and support the group who might feel that helping with the normal scouting activities isn't for them.

Running our minibuses is critical to the Scouting activities that the Group is able to provide. We are seeking a new role share for our **Transport Manager**, an activity **which will take at most an hour or two each week**.

On behalf of the 7th Epsom (Methodist) Scout Exec, the Transport Manager manages and is responsible for the operation of the group's minibuses and two trailers. The role includes coordinating:

- Booking Management all year, but minimal effort
- Licensing and insurance a few interventions each year
- Managing Driver Assurance and Training as needed, but infrequent
- Maintenance booking annual MoT and servicing together with any remedial maintenance required through the year

A full role specification is available on request, and if we get two volunteers, one can handle the first three items with all activities associated with maintenance handled by the other.

The Beavers had a busy half term in the run up to Christmas. We began by helping with a litter pick after the firework display at Hook Road Arena.

In the week before Remembrance Day our activities focused on explaining why we have Remembrance services and about the work of the Armed Forces. Clearwater Beavers was lucky to have a parent coming in to tell us about his time in the army. Beavers took part in the Remembrance Day parade and service at the Methodist church.

In the following weeks we worked on our space badge, starting with a night hike on Epsom Downs where we just about managed to see the moon, some stars and some planets between layers of clouds. We followed this with a meeting inside, carrying out various activities to help us recognise constellations, learn about the solar system and find out interesting space facts.

We then made the most of being indoors to work on our creative badge, which for Clearwater beavers involved performing some of Aesop's fables, constructing and firing space rockets, using our imagination to design our own super heroes, and learning some basic origami by making a cheerful chatter box. The term ended with our usual Christmas party with lots of fun, games and snacks.



This half term we will be spending a bit more time indoors to avoid the dark and the winter weather. In January we will have a visit from Wildlife Aid Foundation in Leatherhead. They are an animal charity dedicated to the rescue, rehabilitation and release of British wildlife. We will learn about the charitable work they do, and in the following weeks will work on some educational and fundraising activities. As well as supporting this charity, these activities will contribute to the beaver challenge badges by teaching them about different types of animals and about the local community.
